How Coronavirus is Affecting the Climate?

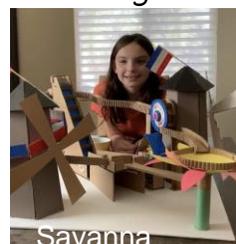
